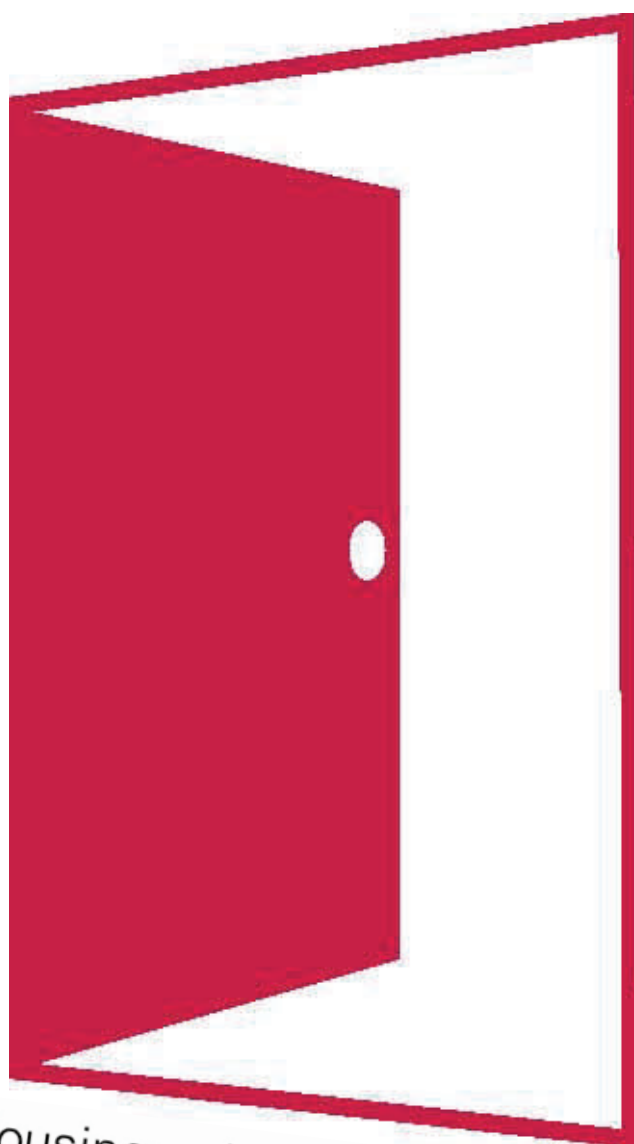

The Constitution states that members elect the Board, but the Board elects the Officers at its first meeting after the AGM, so today only Board Members are elected.

In the Constitution, there is no provision for nominations from the floor, as they all had to be in writing to the Office last week. Any unfilled vacancies can be filled by appointment by the Board, at a later date.



Five nominations were received for 4 vacancies.

Daniel, Peter and Yvonne are eligible for renomination, and have sent in the appropriate forms and they are standing for re-election.

We also received nominations on the appropriate forms from Sylvia Brideoake and Poni Tongum. They are standing for election to the Board.

Chair's Report

At last year's Shelter SA Annual General Meeting I spoke about the need to raise awareness of the housing inequity being experienced by South Australians. It has been satisfying to see housing issues gain so much media and political attention over the last twelve months and Shelter SA hopes that this translates into concrete actions.

Over this period of time there has been a change in Federal government and a new focus on the way Australian housing policy is addressed. There has also been the continued work of the South Australian Social Inclusion Unit and the development of many innovative programs, at both a Government and non-Government level. The race seems to be on in the search for the best response for people experiencing housing crisis and homelessness.

Shelter SA has played a critical role in this process and attempted to shape both State and Federal government decision making. This has occurred through submissions, involvement in a range of boards, networks and committees, and by tirelessly talking about the issues of housing and homelessness.

Shelter SA has also created many opportunities for people to think and talk about housing issues, including arranging a number of forums and events that highlight particular needs in the community. Shelter SA continues to cultivate sub-branches as a way of gathering and disseminating information to key population groups. This year in particular has seen ASHRA and the Women's Housing Caucus being joined by the Aboriginal Homelessness and Housing Support Branch.

It is important to take this opportunity to thank the people who make up Shelter SA who are always looking at new and dynamic ways to spread the message that all South Australians deserve affordable, appropriate, accessible and sustainable housing. Due to their passion for the job Gary, Margo, Cate, Cheryl and Jan consistently provide more than their job descriptions require. Thanks are also given to the old and new members who support Shelter SA's mission.

As outgoing Chairperson of Shelter SA special mention needs to be made of the Board Members and their commitment to the development of Shelter SA. One long standing Board Member in particular, Alan Moore, has this year gone above and beyond in providing his time to maintain the quality of Shelter SA. Alan has made the decision not to renominate and despite his pledges of continued voluntary support for Shelter, the Board will not be the same without him.



For the year ahead Shelter SA aims to continue to advocate to both State and Federal government for the housing needs of all South Australians. A part of this will be closely monitoring the development of the White Paper on homelessness, the National Affordable Housing Agreement and the way this impacts on South Australian housing policy decisions. To achieve this Shelter SA will keep speaking with people in government and non-government sectors, policy makers and service providers, and most importantly with those people who manage the day to day difficulties of accessing appropriate housing.

Executive Director's Report

Housing is a topic that never goes away. And the problem of the lack of affordable housing not only doesn't go away, it just gets worse. Australia is simply not building enough new homes to meet the demand and need, and as a consequence, more people than ever are renting in a very tight and competitive housing market. As long as there is excess demand, house prices and rents will continue to rise at a rate faster than incomes.

At least the new Australian (Labor) Government has fulfilled its election promises and has brought in a number of measures to begin to address the issue:

- The Government called for submissions to a White Paper, on a 10 year plan to reduce homelessness
- The Federal Social Inclusion Board has been established
- An audit of Commonwealth land that could be used for residential land release is under way
- Work has begun on a National Affordable Housing Agreement to replace the Commonwealth State Housing Agreement which expires in December 2008
- The First Home Saver Account program has been set up
- A National Rental Affordability Scheme has been launched
- The Housing Affordability Fund was established
- and the National Housing Supply Research Council has been appointed.

At a more local level of context, the State Government has begun a new service delivery model in Housing SA, but has abolished the Aboriginal Housing Authority and the Community Housing Authority (services from both have been incorporated into Housing SA). In other State Government developments during 2007-08 it was announced that:

- The Affordable Housing Innovations Unit continues to work with community groups, delivering plans for about 200 new homes.
- Street to Home program has housed 200-300 long-term homeless people
- Common Ground opened the new units over the new city bus station
- *The Affordable Home Ownership Initiative* was launched, to give homebuyers earning less than \$59,000 a year the first option to purchase many affordable homes in South Australia.
- The Private Rental Liaison Officer program was expanded, assisting 460 low-income earners and families into private rental accommodation.
- SA became the first state to establish a target of 15 per cent affordable housing in new developments;

Shelter SA promotes the right of every person to access affordable, safe and secure long term housing that they identify as appropriate to their needs. Among the ways Shelter did this during the years was by convening a meeting of community stakeholders for a discussion with Professor Julian Disney about meeting housing needs. Prof. Disney was the guest speaker at the 2007 AGM, speaking on "Desperate Households: The Creeping Crisis in Housing Affordability".



Once again, Shelter organised the successful Homelessness, Health and, Housing Expo for over 300 participants, with more than 30 service providers present. This event is growing each year. In the lead-up to that, a Health and Homelessness Forum was held.

Shelter co-hosted the Anti-Social Behaviour Orders forum with Youth Affairs Council of SA (YACSA) and SA Council of Social Services (SACOSS), and the Minister's Strategic Housing Advisory Committee forum.

In early 2008, Shelter co-hosted the Youth Homelessness forum with YACSA and Homelessness SA and convened a seminar with the Miller Live-n-Learn centre staff from Sydney. Staff also organised the placement of several hundred house symbols in various Adelaide parks during Youth Homelessness week, to raise community awareness. In June, we organised the Memorial Service for those who have died while homeless.

Staff facilitated a SAAP (Supported Accommodation Assistance Program) seminar, ran a multicultural housing information day, and organised workshops on the National Rental Affordability Scheme and the National Affordable Housing Agreement with Prof. Julian Disney.

In addition, Shelter raised awareness of housing issues by presenting at the SA Powerhouse Conference, an Australian Refugee Association housing seminar, and at the Western Anti-Poverty hypothetical. The Executive Director was invited to lecture to Flinders University social work students and to UniSA property students. Staff made presentations to Lutheran Community Care, the National Council for Single Mothers and their Children national conference, and the Migrant Women's Association housing workshop.

Speaking engagements included a Lutheran Tenancy forum, Red Cross staff and volunteers, and a St Vincent de Paul Society housing forum.

Other efforts in promoting the right of every person to access affordable, safe and secure long term housing included talking in six radio interviews, doing three television stories, and being quoted ten times in the press. In addition, Shelter staff had two articles published in *Parity* magazine and two in Australasian Housing Institute's *Housing Works*.

Part of Shelter's effectiveness is its network and the organisations we liaise with and the events Shelter participates in. Shelter SA is an active member of National Shelter, and as such, took part in working with the National Affordable Housing Summit Group. A policy platform was developed by National Shelter and widely distributed prior to the Federal election. Shelter SA and Adelaide Major Charities Organisation published a half-page advertisement in the *Advertiser* prior to the election, calling for all parties to give more attention to meeting housing needs.



The Executive Director attended the national ACOSS Congress and the Adelaide Affordable Housing Summit. He represents Shelter SA on the SACOSS Policy Council and participates in the Department for Families and Communities/Dept of Health/Peaks meetings. Wherever staff go, we actively promote the Tenants Information and Advocacy Service and Habitat for Humanity.

The staff of Shelter work with Homelessness SA, the Community Housing Council, YACSA, the Mental Health Coalition, and the Welfare Rights Centre. We have participated in Habitat for Humanity events, Tenants Information and Advocacy Service's Northern Housing and Health Expo, and the Mental Health Coalition stall on Rundle Mall.

Contact is maintained with Adelaide City Council, the Housing Legal Clinics, Centacare SAAP in Murray Bridge, St Vincent de Paul Society, Roofs Housing Association, Portway Housing Association, Housing Spectrum, Comhouse Cooperative, Housing SA's Operational Policies Advisory Committee, Nunga Miminar Women's Shelter, and Street 2 Home.

There are other groups with housing, or housing-related, concerns that Shelter interacts with, including the Land Management Corporation, National Council for Single Mothers and their Children, Aboriginal Legal Rights Movement, Child, Youth & Women's Health Services, YWCA, Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Congress, Uniting Care Wesley Adelaide, Uniting Care Wesley Port Adelaide, Volunteering SA and Southern Junction Community Services.

Shelter contributed to the DFC Caravan Parks research project, and participated in the Balaklava Community Development seminar and Australia Fair Campaign in Victoria Square.

The Southern Australian Housing and Urban Research Institute (AHURI) Centre and the Australasian Housing Institute are two organisations Shelter is involved with. Service providers, such as Service to Youth Council, Seniors Information Service, Mission Australia, Lutheran Community Care, Bowden-Brompton Housing Services, Multi-Agency Housing Association (now Unity Housing Company) and Helping Hand provide Shelter with information about peoples' housing circumstances. Over time, there have been discussions with several members of Parliament, and a number of election candidates.

In the course of our work, we have regular contact with home owners, private renters, housing associations, Housing SA tenants, boarding house residents, housing support workers and homeless people.

It has been important for staff at Shelter to stay abreast of issues by attending the National Housing Conference, ACOSS Congress, and the State of Australian Cities conference. We have also attended Homelessness SA forums, the Social Exclusion, Violence and Homelessness forum, the Planning Institute of Australia McKenna Memorial lecture, PIA seminars, and the Council on the Ageing "Affordable Housing seminar".



Staying informed about developments in the housing sector has meant attending the Minister's Strategic Housing Advisory Committee's Roundtable, forum and two consultations. Staff attended briefings by Housing SA, the Common Ground launch, and the SACOSS consultation on utilities. Other activities included the ACOSS Future of the Sector Day, Red Cross Asylum Seeker seminar and network meetings, the launch of a book on sustainability, and the launch of Calvary Housing Association.

Shelter was asked for advice on the regulations for the Residential Villages Act, and was involved in the ANZ bank's development of products for Indigenous home ownership. Shelter SA contributed to the SACOSS *Blueprint for the Eradication of Poverty*.

Eleven issues of our newsletter, *Sheltershortz*, were published and distributed, and Shelter SA's website received 24,000 hits during the year, peaking at 2,700/month in May. The *Sexcluded* report received 1,500 hits and the *Too Big to Ignore* report received 1,000. The *Snapshotz* on Home Ownership received 1,200 hits. In addition, several short, practical brochures were developed: *Where to Look for a Rental Property; Applying for a Rental Property; How to Be a Good Tenant; Mental Health and Housing*.

Shelter provided field placements for a number of social work and community services students, and participated in the TAFE Community Services Expo.

Internally, policies and procedures are being reviewed and updated, and a Community Employers Association Industrial Relations Workshop was attended. All legislative, statutory and regulatory obligations have been met.

BRANCHES:

The Women's Housing Caucus commissioned the research report, *Too Big to Ignore: Future Issues for Australian Women's Housing* and formally launched it and held a forum on the topic. The report has been widely used to raise the issues of housing for women in a market where they are often disadvantaged.

ASHRA (Agencies Supporting Housing for Refugees and Asylum seekers) published the ASHRA Multicultural Directory and held regular meetings. A multicultural housing information day was held in the city. Three ASHRA newsletters were published and distributed.

The Aboriginal Homelessness and Housing Support branch is currently being formed and has been holding a number of meetings. Importantly, Shelter developed and formally adopted a Reconciliation Statement.



CONCLUSION

During the past year, Cate Jones joined us as Projects Officer and we will make use of her considerable skills. I sincerely thank the staff and Board of Management for their efforts, support and dedication during the year.

Shelter's funding is secure until June 2009, after the CSHA (Commonwealth/State Housing Agreement) runs out at the end of December 2008. We hope the National Affordable Housing Agreement will fund Shelter SA in the future so we can continue to advocate for affordable and secure housing for people on low incomes in South Australia.

TREASURERS REPORT TO SHELTER'S A.G.M

The past year has once again been a very stable year for Shelter SA, although there were a few changes in the Board Members. We fortunately have a full compliment of staff, offering constancy, and stability within the organisation and servicing the community. This has assisted Shelter SA to move forward and implement some good financial strategies. Our financial management structures are frequently being reviewed, with regular refocusing on the budget.

We have managed to constantly operate with a small surplus through-out the year, and have successfully got to the point of break-even this year.

Shelter SA is embarking on the last year of our funding for this round, but has security until June 2009.

We, like many organisations will be looking at the new NAHA to find where we fit into its scope, with anticipation of ongoing funding.

As part of our ongoing management practices we will be seeking grants for specific projects.

As you may be aware, the State Government is recommending that all community services that are tenanted in the Torrens Building relocate to make space for the university to expand. We are hoping that this strategy will not take place as it will have an impact on our budget and service delivery.

We are continuing to maintain National Shelter's finances and appear to be doing a reasonable job as they have requested that we keep the finances operational from South Australia.

I thank the Board Members for their support and participation over the past 12 months; meetings were productive with stimulating debate.

I wish to thank the staff for assisting the Board, for producing very readable reports, and keeping the Board aware of various projects that they are working on. I would like to acknowledge Jan. Jan as the Book-Keeper ensures that all the financial obligations are met whilst executing her work.

Cheryl has to be mentioned on two accounts as Receptionist she is always obliging and prepared to assist where she can but also as an assistant and back-up support to Jan. Finally I thank Gary for leading the Staff, facilitating the Board, representing Shelter within the sector and supporting the Members of Shelter S.A. But collectively it has been a team effort. Thanks Team.

The auditor has approved the books and the financial statements as highly acceptable. Once again thanks to Jan. He has not found any discrepancies with the books and we will continue to present them using the same systems.
